## Trinity College Chapel Choir

There were several plans to establish a university in Dublin during the sixteenth century, but it was not until 1592 that these plans came to fruition. A royal charter dated 3 March 1591, old style, provided for the 'College of the most Holy and Undivided Trinity of the foundation of Queen Elizabeth, near Dublin'. The site for the new university was to have been at Saint Patrick's Cathedral but the then Archbishop of Dublin, Adam Loftus, did not favour this plan and so a new site was chosen. The suppressed Augustinian priory of All Hallows became the home of the new university. Although this site is now considered to be right in the heart of the Dublin it was then about an half-mile to the east of the city walls; hence the qualification *iuxta Dublinia*.

The early history of the Chapel and its music remains obscure but by the middle of the seventeenth century there are records of the appointment of an organist to the college. The first regular choir in the College Chapel was established by Provost Francis Andrews in 1762. The present Chapel building was consecrated in 1798 just three years after the foundation of Saint Patrick's College Maynooth. Choral music in the College Chapel remained largely dependent on singers from Saint Patrick's and Christ Church Cathedral until the late 1960s, when it was decided that there should be an independent choral foundation in Trinity. Organ and Choral Scholarships were established and a mixed choir of about thirty voices was formed.

In addition to the regular choral services during each week of lecture term and various special College and University services, the Chapel Choir goes on an international trip every year and some of the music at evensong this evening has been performed by the choir in New York, Hong Kong and many countries in continental Europe.

### Choral Evensong

Choral Evensong has become an international 'hallmark' of the Anglican Church. The origins of this Service may be found in the ancient monastic offices. Archbishop Thomas Cramner conflated these older offices to provide just two daily liturgies at the reformation. While the monks had been singing offices many times each day, after the suppression of the monasteries by King Henry VIII, clergy who were no longer in religious orders celebrated the offices just twice a day: one in the morning (Mattins) and one in the evening (Evensong). In the case of Evensong, the canticle *Magnificat* is taken from the office of Vespers while the *Nunc Dimittis* comes from Compline. This 'new' office of Evensong was enshrined in the Book of Common Prayer which had its first manifestation in 1549 in the reign of King Edward VI. This prayer book has been part of the daily life of the Anglican Church since the reformation. The text used this evening is from the 1662 revision of the Prayer Book

after the Restoration of Charles II. This version was that which was used in the Church of Ireland until liturgical reforms in the late twentieth century. This 1662 version and it is still widely used as an alternative to modern language translation versions of Evensong.

The book of Common Prayer provides for the entire Psalter to be to be said or sung every month. The Psalter is divided into 30 days with Psalms 1 to 5 being sung at Mattins for Day 1 and by the end of the month Psalms 147 to 150 are sung at Evesong of Day 30. The psalm appointed for Evensong on Day 11 is Psalm 59. The translation of the Psalter used in the Book of Common Prayer is that of Myles Coverdale (1488 – 1569 Bishop of Exeter 1551–53). The readings at Evensong today are taken from the Authorised version of King James I (1611).

Trinity College Chapel Choir is delighted and honoured to share this ancient liturgy with you this evening as part of the celebrations of 225 years at Saint Patrick's College, Maynooth.

### **A note on the music at evensong**

The Preces and Responses are sung to a setting by Orlando Gibbons (1583–1625). These responses were widely sung at the time of the foundation of Saint Patrick's College and are still commonly used. The psalm is sung to a chant in c minor by William Sydney Greig (1910–83). Greig was organist of Trinity College Chapel (1960–67) and organist of Saint Patrick's Cathedral (1960–76). He combined these posts with a busy teaching career. One of his pupils was Gerard Gillen, Professor of Music at Maynooth (1985–2007). The *Magnificat* and *Nunc Dimittis* are sung to a setting by George Henry Phillips Hewson (1881–1972). Hewson was organist of Trinity College Chapel 1927– 1960 and Professor of Music at Trinity 1935–62. He was also organist of Saint Patrick's Cathedral 1920–60. Hewson was succeeded as organist of both Saint Patrick's Cathedral and Trinity College by his former assistant organist W. S. Greig in 1960. The anthem is a setting of words by George Herbert (1593–1633) *Let all the world in every corner sing* by W. S. Greig.

## A GENERAL CONFESSION

**Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; And we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults. Restore thou them that are penitent; According to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; That we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, To the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.**

THE ABSOLUTION or Remission of sins is pronounced by the priest alone.

## **THE FIRST LESSON**

**THE SECOND LESSON**
