Summit marks first step on listening and learning journey

The Church in Ireland has embarked on a synodal pathway of listening and learning from many different voices to discern the signs of the times and map a way forward. Likewise, St Patrick's College will embark on a similar pathway of learning and listening to many voices from the fields of pastoral ministry, education, business, politics, law as well as our alumni at a Maynooth 'summit' to be held at the College on 23 April (Easter Week).

The implementation of the College's strategic plan A Vision for Renewal and Transformation 2020-30 will form the context of the summit. The College is revising and expanding its academic programmes to reach a broader cohort of students and with the development of the new Centre for Mission and Ministries we are working with partners to deliver new qualifications in counselling, youth ministry, and health care chaplaincy in response to pastoral needs. At a strategic level, the College is engaging with stakeholders about how its spatial resources will futureproof the College's mission of formation and education.

The purpose of the summit is to enlist a broad base of advocates in Ireland for our strategic plan and to resource its implementation. The multifaceted nature of the strategic plan and the recently revised governance structures, designed to enable the College to deliver its mission, will require more lay involvement with

the comprehensive skillset and experience in order for the College to continue to make a spiritual, educational and pastoral impact. The day will include a number of presentations from key speakers, including former Taoiseach, John Bruton, with ample opportunities for participants to share their ideas.

The summit will be an exchange of ideas and draw on the many gifts, charisms, experience, expertise, skills, and competencies of the participants to help discern how St Patrick's College can move forward with the Church and society, both nationally and internationally.

Returning to a semblance of normal campus life

Following a long period of online studies and remote learning, students of St Patrick's Pontifical University finally got a chance to return to Loftus Halls in September 2021. It was certainly not 'business as usual' as some public-health restrictions were still in place when the new academic year got under way in September 2021.

Masks, online exams and social distancing we still in place for much of the semester. However, it was wonderful to see students wander the corridors and cloisters again. Initiatives such as orientations, re-orientations and social activities were to the fore along with outdoor seating areas to fit in with the 'new normal.' Pop up vaccination tents were in place along with complimentary masks and sanitisers.

The extent to which we are now able to teach in person and return to some semblance of normal campus life is precisely because of our adherence to public health guidelines along with other safety measures.

As we came together for the second semester, with a further relaxing of restrictions, the SPPU management team continued to meet regularly and adjust its guidance based on information regarding the COVID-19 situation on a regular basis.

What we as a community at SPPU have learned is that the pandemic has amplified how important social interactions can be for mental health. A discussion before or after class, a lecture question that identifies a common interest, can underpin social networks for students who might be from another city, county or another country. With life becoming increasingly fast-paced, and increasingly digital, SPPU may offer one of the last opportunities for young adults to meet face-to-face on a daily basis. The need for on-campus education has never been greater whilst utilising the tools and skills gathered during our online learning experience.

New programmes

SPPU didn't sit back during the pandemic. As we adapted to a new learning environment, programme development grew at an exponential rate. This included launching a new undergraduate degree in Counselling which commences in September 2022. We also have a Professional Diploma in Youth Ministry and Spirituality also commencing in September. With the advent of online learning and micro-credentials our new partnership with Aspal (aspal.ie) has never been more important in reaching out to communities and parishes both in Ireland and abroad. There are a number of new partnerships and programmes in development and SPPU looks forward to continuing to grow its academic programme offerings and student numbers in the coming years.

Ministries 2021-22



Shining a light on the latest Christian thinking research

From 27 – 30 April, academics from all over the world will come to St Patrick's Pontifical University Maynooth to discuss *The Future of Christian Thinking*. The theme for the conference reflects widespread international interest on Christian thought.

Indeed, in the last few decades, philosophical concern with Christian thought has dominated many of the publications and much of the research in philosophy. Questions of the existence and nature of God, His relation to creation, His salvific will, the problem of suffering, heaven and hell and so on have appeared in the recent philosophical literature.

The issue of Christian thinking touches every aspect of our modern society. There is no part of human life that is not in some way brought into focus by reflection on the mysteries of the Christian faith. Not only that, but philosophical thought has also continually found the truths professed by Christianity to contain within themselves a philosophical dimension worthy of pursuit. It is indeed the case, that there is a mutual interchange between the water of philosophy and the wine of theology.

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Among others, speakers include Rowan Williams, David Bentley Hart, Cyril O'Regan, Eleonore Stump, as well as members of our own distinguished Faculty of Philosophy. Anyone who is interested in Christian thought and the philosophical dimension thereof will gain something positive through attending this conference. Renowned international speaker to deliver ITQ guest lecture



We are delighted to welcome Dr Celia Deane-Drummond, Director of the Laudato Si Research Institute and Senior Research Fellow in


theology at Campion Hall, University of Oxford to deliver the 2022 Irish Theological Quarterly (ITQ) annual lecture on the Theological Foundations of Pope Francis's Integral Ecology.

Dr Deane-Drummond is widely recognised internationally as a public speaker and has published hundreds of articles in academic and other journals.

She is also honorary visiting Professor in Theology and Science at the University of Durham, UK. Her work at the interface of theology, ethics and the biological and human sciences stems from her prior academic experience in plant physiology as well as theology. She was chair of the European Forum for the Study of Religion and Environment from 2011-2018.

Her research interests focus on the interface between theology and science and recent publications include *The Evolution of Wisdom Volume I: Theological Ethics Through a Multispecies Lens* (2019) and *Shadow Sophia: The Evolution of Wisdom Volume II* (2021).
