

Science for Seminaries arrives at SPPU

Science & Divine Action Conference

t Patrick's Pontifical
University has successfully applied for funding from the Templeton Foundation through ECLAS (Equipping Christian Leaders in an Age of Science) in order to institute a Science for Seminaries program here in Maynooth.

The program serves not only to expose the seminarians to scientific discourse and cultivate their confidence in asking scientific questions, but also to help them better appreciate scientific insights and how these insights can enhance the practice and understanding of their ministry.

The project includes a year-long module for seminarians dedicated to the theme, "Divine Action and the Sacraments," which will introduce seminarians and postgraduate students at the SPPU to key concepts and themes in discourse at the intersection of the natural sciences, philosophy, and theology. The Head of the Vatican Observatory, Br Guy Consulmagno SJ, opened this year's program with a lecture on "The Things They Ask the Pope's Astronomer."

On another occasion, Andrew Pinsent (University of Oxford) spoke about the Catholic contributions to science and science's relationship to the life of grace. Peter van der Burgt (MU) discussed the relationship between science and religion.

The project will conclude with a public international conference on 18-19 April on "Science and Divine Action." Scientists and philosophers from all over the world will come to speak on evolution, the big bang, chemistry, and the sacraments, including seven keynote speakers from the US, Canada, Argentina, UK, and Ireland. All are welcome!

Launch of Diploma in Youth Ministry

here was a great buzz in Pugin Hall on the evening of 18 January. The Salesians of Don Bosco Ireland, faculty and staff of SPPU and invited guests had come together to celebrate the Salesian-SPPU partnership and the launch of the Diploma in Youth Ministry and Spirituality.

SPPU and the Salesians share a commitment to education, to empowering young people and to equipping people to engage in youth ministry. The ceremonial signing of the Memorandum of Understanding marked a key moment in the relationship and a commitment to future development. Joy and hope are integral to Salesian spirituality; those sentiments were powerfully captured in the beautiful rendition of "How Great Thou Art" which wrapped up the formal proceedings.

The Diploma is designed to give people without a formal qualification in theology a professional qualification while developing their skills and honing their ability to bring faith and practice into

fruitful dialogue. It is also designed for students or graduates of primary degrees in theology who need an appropriate methodological and pastoral qualification to engage in research in youth ministry at post-graduate level. In line with our other pastoral programmes, the practicum and academic learning run alongside each other. Classes and theological reflection groups take place on Thursdays and Fridays on campus, leaving the rest of the week to undertake supervised placement. This arrangement allows students to be part of a vibrant learning community while facilitating placements across a broad geographical spread. We look forward to building on connections made and strengthened at the launch as we develop and grow the programme.

Update from the Dean of Theology

ver the last few years SPPU has been focused on increasing our research activity. A quick scroll of the News and Events section of our website gives a good sense of the many talks, conference papers and publications for both academic and more general audiences.

The Maynooth Reflects series is an initiative in which SPPU faculty together with invited contributors address contemporary issues in a manner accessible to a general audience. The first two volumes, on Covid and on End of Life, have already been published and many of us are studiously writing for the third, on Catechesis.

The University recently introduced Honorary Research Fellowships and we currently have two fellows. Dr Alexander O'Hara is a historian who specialises in medieval monasticism and hagiography as well as being Ireland's National Director for Catechetics. Maria Cimperman RCSJ of Catholic Theological Union is spending part of her year sabbatical with SPPU. Her research in synodality, the consecrated life, reconciliation and peacebuilding holds great relevance for Ireland. SPPU is organising several conferences and international symposia, including the Science and Divine Action conference in April and an international symposium on The Future of Systematic Theology in June.

We are undertaking a major review of some undergraduate programmes to ensure they remain relevant in a rapidly changing landscape. Although most of our students choose a bachelor's degree that combines Theology with Arts subjects, we identify a small but significant cohort who are looking for a more thorough grounding in the Catholic tradition. The most significant element of the revision of the BTh will be the introduction of Primary Text Seminars in which students, throughout their three-

year programme, would read and discuss classic works crucial to a fuller grasp of the Catholic intellectual tradition, from Aristotle and Augustine to Julian of Norwich and Dorothy Day.

The question animating our discernment here in Ireland is: "What does God want from the Church in Ireland at this time?" What indeed? It is all too easy to answer that question by putting forward our own visions or preferences. But what we are being called to do is much more exciting - much more radical - than that. We are invited to trust that God is at work and that God is inviting us to work alongside God to bring to reality some of God's dream for Ireland and for the world. The Centre for Mission and Ministries, rooted in the Catholic tradition and

open to the work of the Spirit of God in the world, seeks to support and develop a wide diversity of callings and aiftedness among the people of God. We are forming youth ministers, healthcare chaplains, permanent deacons, liturgists, musicians, and pastoral ministers from Ireland and abroad. And we are doing this in collaboration with an ever-expanding community of partners-in-ministry who provide supervised placement sites for our pastoral students. A concentrated focus on the practical element alongside an emphasis on theological reflection is a real strength of our pastoral programmes. It could not be done without the generosity and commitment of our partners. Collaboration is key!
